Types of Graduate School Funding

Fellowships

Usually offered by private orgs or government. Typically funds research projects.

Grants

Sum of money given for a particular purpose.

Prizes/Awards

A major achievement that is recognized in some way; could be monetary.

Assistantships/Traineeships

Type of education/training under a mentor/supervisor where the student is paid for specific work in a specific discipline. Funding can be from university or a grant.



Finding Funding Sources

- Networking mentors, supervisors, colleagues, etc.
- Electronic Databases
- Scholarly Literature
- Agency searches

 Government, corporations, foundations, professional/scholarly organizations

SPIN, which stands for Sponsored Programs Information Network, is an extensive research funding opportunity database. SPIN contains over 40,000 opportunities from more than 10,000 sponsors. With SPIN, you can: Access funding information online from any browser, organize grant information in one convenient place, gain access to the largest keyword list, allowing for greater flexibility in your searches, quickly locate Limited Submission Opportunities with Federal or non-Federal programs, and locate all types of funding information—Fed Business Opps / Federal Register Guide.

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

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Timelines

- Best Time to Search
 - What year in the program to start looking?
 - What year in the program to start applying?

- Discipline specific
 - Need to become familiar with the typical patterns of your discipline



Research & Planning

- Start Early
 - Learn about funding opportunities; they are discipline/program specific.
 - Consult advisor, committee members, program director, etc.
 - Ask about the best source of information for your specific field and research project?

• Be Proactive

- Review the literature who is funding published dissertations you are reading?
- Develop an abstract or proposal and ask mentors about it.



Research & Planning

Set deadlines for

- 1. Writing portions of the grant
- 2. Developing timelines
- 3. Obtaining recommendations
- 3. Attending trainings, if needed



Research & Planning

- Spend time learning more about proposals & writing guidelines
- Read submitted proposals of previous dissertation students
- Talk with past winners; search "awards made" databases
- Attend training sessions from the funding agencies, if available
